DEJA VU INC

Colin Barnett was quick to warn from the Opposition benches that Labor in power would mean the ghosts of WA Inc would stir.

Unlike Boomtown's former Dear Leader, the Bull doesn't like to live in the past. But we can't resist noting that the Insurance Commission of WA has declared it will likely reopen the data room for potential buyers of its \$250 million-plus CBD office tower Westralia Square — a plot of land central to WA Inc.

The tower, with a net lettable area of 32,630sqm is 95 per cent occupied, with WA Police and Corrective Services (oh, the irony) the headline tenants.

Their leases expire in 2020.

ICWA, which extracted \$606 million from the sale of The Shops at Ellenbrook (\$231.6 million), Livingstone Market (\$87.4 million), Forrest Centre (\$200 million) and Westralia Plaza (\$87 million), would be expecting offers north of \$250 million for Westralia Square.

Readers with long memories will recall the SGIC (an earlier iteration of the Insurance Commission) bought Westralia Square, with GESB (30 per cent), for \$55 million in 1989 from Kerry Packer and Warren Anderson. The commission bought GESB's stake for \$33 million in 1995, valuing the property then about \$100 million.

ICWA chief executive Rod Whithear said he was pleased about the "escalation in interest" from potential Westralia Square buyers.

"Several significant investors have put indicative offers to the Insurance Commission," he said. "We are thinking about opening the data room for Westralia Square in the next few weeks so prospective bidders for Westralia Square can develop informed and attractive offers.
